Train your cat from an early age to accept and trust being in a crate. Feed them in their crate and make a game of carrying them around the house in the crate—it will get them used to it. Both cats and dogs do need a regular dental checks as plaque build up is inevitable, but they can also suffer from tooth cracks, abscesses and more. Why Are My Cat's Eyes Red?

Four of the most common causes for red eyes are as follows. Your cat may have feline conjunctivitis, also known as pink eye. It may be caused by a viral infection, an allergy, or an irritant such as cigarette smoke, cleaning products, or even dust. Is your cat an indoor or outdoor cat? An outdoor cat may have a reaction to pollen, grass, bees or other irritants. Bring your cat into see us. We will first do an examination of your cat, and if need be run some tests to find the cause of the eye reacting as it has. Treatment varies from antibiotics to other topical ointments that help to alleviate the problem. If you have other cats in your home, quarantine you affected kitty until the health crisis is over. Be gentle when handling your kitty as they can become aggressive if they become scared. We can show you how to apply topical eyedrops in a way that is quick and easy.

Deadly Parvovirus. Canine parvovirus is a virus that is highly contagious and is spread from dog to dog by direct or indirect contact with their faeces. Vaccines can prevent this infection, but mortality can reach 91% in untreated cases. Treatment often involves veterinary hospitalization. Puppies are very susceptible to this disease with the greatest risk being at the age of 6 weeks to 6 months of age. A vaccinated dog can still get Parvo but the vax greatly reduces the risk of the disease. Grown dogs are vaccinated once a year. Signs of the disease include a fever, lethargy, lack of appetite, followed by vomiting and diarrhea within two days of the symptoms. There is no medicine for this condition, the only hope is that your dog's system can fight off the virus. Veterinary care increases their chances of survival by keeping them well nourished and hydrated being the key.

Parasite Protection for Your Pet.

Now is the perfect time to follow up before the spring, and to ensure your pet is adequately covered for the months ahead. A treatment for the external pests such as fleas and ticks will knock them for a six, while an internal treatment will sort out the nasty worms. Preventative treatment is always a lot cheaper than surgery for the damage done by these parasites.
